

INTERNATIONAL LAW CASES II

II Semester, Professor Marlene M. Losier

24 hours – Cfu: 3

This course focuses on five international law cases through which students will be exposed to a variety of matters that are at the intersection of laws from more than one jurisdiction. The five cases will cover a variety of practice areas, domestic laws and international conventions.

Required reading materials will be available on Professor Losier's webpage of this website before the start of the course.

The final exam will be an in-class exam composed of two essays. These essays will cover material and legal theories covered in the course. Additionally, students will be asked to turn in a short paper on a subject previously agreed upon with Professor Losier. Attendance and participation during the course will be incorporated into the final grade.

Marlène M. Losier is a Ph.D. candidate at the European University Institute (Fiesole, Italy) specializing on the issue of title rights to cultural relics. Her research focuses on title rights in dispute particularly at auction and over underwater cultural relics. Among her other experiences, Professor Losier has worked as a practicing attorney at the international law firm of Fullbright & Jaworski L.L.P. (Houston, Texas & Washington, DC, USA) in the areas of corporate law, international arbitration and international litigation.
